In our university, according to the previous European Policy Statement and Erasmus University Charter given by the European Commission, we ensure full academic recognition for all study and placement periods spent abroad by students, in a partner institution or company. Also, for our staff mobilities we fully recognise their mobilities as an important part of their academic and professional development. All student mobilities either for studies or placements are included in the Diploma Supplement which is given to all students for free at the end of their studies. The ECTS system is totally implemented in all our faculties and all ECTS obtained during mobilities abroad at an institutional partner abroad are transferred in our university. Equally, all students are completing a Learning Agreement or a Training Agreement before leaving abroad which ensures a transparent transfer of their ECTS after mobility. http://www.univcb.ro/p-47-department.of.international.relations.html

Constantin Brancoveanu University has over 30 bilateral and inter-institutional agreements signed in the framework of the Erasmus Programme with partner institutions that are holding an Erasmus University Charter awarded by the European Commission. The strategy for signing bilateral agreements is established at central and institutional level and the International Relations Office with the Erasmus component takes care of the number of existing partnerships, nature of the partnership, including quality matters of the agreement, location of partners, academic or training based interest of a potential cooperation for our institution and beneficiaries. For placements or traineeships we established strong partnerships in order to give to our students and staff the chance to enjoy quality training and added value to their future professional developments. Internal regulations are also creating the framework for the steps to follow to manage institutional agreements.

The Erasmus Programme it was from the beginning a driven factor for European universities in their ways to gain quality in internationalization, academic governance and openness to a new type of a more entrepreneurial university. For CBU participating in Erasmus for so many years was the way to achieve all this aspects. That's why, the internationalization agenda and the transfer of knowledge represents for CBU an important part of its strategy for short and long term. By promoting academic exchanges and creating learning alliances for the development of research, new teaching methods, modernization of curricula, promoting foreign language skills, employability of our students, intercultural knowledge, flexibility and tolerance, CBU is planning the meet the European internationalization agenda. Complying with Bologna requirements by providing high quality in teaching and learning but also in the development of internationalization process its one of our main goals at CBU.

Supplementary to the internationalization strategy in our university we developed a very detailed planning for all activities, targets and goals. We are focusing on: Student and staff mobility; An improved international curricula; International projects and Double/Joint degrees development, Internationalization at home.

The framework for the cooperation with EU and non EU institutions gave us the possibility to setup the agenda for partnerships which comprise the selection of future partners and the improvements of actual agreements. We tend to a number of 40 bilateral agreement bot with EU and non-EU institutional partners. The strategy for choosing the partners is well established in our core statements, and strategic document at CBU but manly is based on the compatibility of the curriculum, the geographical areas (mostly in Europe), the core subject area. This criteria are supported by organizational systematic review, monitoring and evaluation.

The objectives established for the main target groups at CBU are the following:

For the student and staff: to increase student and staff mobility, both outgoing and incoming (for studies and training) for our bachelor and master's students by promoting actively and in a full transparency the Erasmus Programme and the international opportunities; to increase the number of teaching and staff mobilities in order to improve the quality of teaching, learning, research and curriculum development; to achieve the figures established at European level for the mobile students and staff. Incoming and outgoing students and staff are fully encouraged and supported to access placements and training periods abroad.

For the aspect of internationalization at home activities we are planning to attract more incoming students and staff but also to bring other conferences in our institution, a joint summer school organized with a partner. This key activities and objectives will lead us to an improvement of our curricular areas by the diversity brought by incoming academic staff. The development of double of joint degrees represents the future of our international configuration in terms of research and added value to the European academic culture. In the next academic year we are opening to Romanian and international students a new bachelor degree in English and we plan to develop a double degree with a Portuguese partner based on this degree.

Therefore, we made a high priority from bringing excellence to all activities and processes in order to reach the objectives and to integrate our university into the international higher education.

CBU is an active member of SPACE (European Network for Business Studies and Languages) and involved in the Committee of Double and Joint degrees of this organisation. We are also coordinating the Online Development Committee of SPACE since 2012. From this traditional partnership we are building our prerequisites for our future double and joint programs.

The involvement in new partnerships for developing projects is also a top priority at CBU, and a special department is taking care of this aspects. We have an agenda for projects with the support of business environment where we want to bring also the international dimension of education and cooperation by creating different consortia. Quality assurance, institutional and financial support is establish by our mission as university in all projects that we will support, develop and promote in the future, related to innovation, research, teaching and learning.

Regarding future projects CBU intend to increase cooperation with universities and higher education institutions in order to establish strategic co-operations which could lead to important project design at regional and international level.
